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CHAPTER FIVE

NEBUCHADNEZZAR PUNISHED AND RESTORED

A NUMBER of years passed and King Nebuchadnezzar was at rest in his own house and his kingdom was flourishing. He was well satisfied with himself and his achievements, a dangerous time in any life.

One night he had another very unusual dream, a dream sent from God. This time he remembered what it was, but when he related it to his wise men, astrologers, and magicians, they could not interpret it for him.

Our friend, Daniel, was still in the palace occupying a place of responsibility. After the others had given up trying to interpret the dream Daniel was called into the king's presence and to him the king related his dream in detail.

He said he dreamed that he saw a tree standing in the midst of the earth, and while he looked upon it the tree grew until it reached up to heaven. It was very strong and seemed to spread over the whole earth.

It had beautiful leaves upon it and a great deal of fruit. The animals of the fields stood under its shade and the birds of the air lodged in its branches and all fed upon its fruit.

As he continued to gaze upon this scene, some angels, called Holy Ones, came down from heaven and one of them cried in a loud voice saying—

"Hew down the tree, and cut off his branches, shake off the leaves, and scatter his fruit; let the beasts go away from under it, let the dew fall upon it; but leave the stump of the tree and put a band around it; let the dew fall upon it."

Then the angel spoke as if the tree were a man and said,

"Let his portion be with the beasts and let his heart be changed from a man's heart to the heart of a beast and let this continue for seven years, that the living may know that the Most High ruleth in the kingdom of men, and giveth it to whomsoever he will."

"And now Daniel," said the king when he had finished, "I have asked all of my wise men to tell me the meaning and they are unable to do so. But I know you can for the spirit of the gods is in you."

Daniel had listened very attentively while the king told his dream and, as God made the meaning known to him, he was so astonished and troubled that for an hour he said nothing.

He disliked to tell the king the meaning, for it was not good news. But finally he said, "**My lord**, **the dream be to those who hate you and the interpretation is to your enemies**.

And then, Daniel, great man of God that he was, begged the king to listen to his counsel and break off from his sins and iniquities by showing mercy to the poor that his days might be peaceful.

For twelve months God waited for Nebuchadnezzar to turn to Him but the king grew more and more boastful and selfish. I think he said to himself, "It is a year since Daniel told me that God would send judgment upon me if I didn't repent of my sins. In all of this time nothing has happened. I guess he was mistaken."

Then one day as he walked in the palace he said to himself, "Is not this great Babylon that I have builded for the house of the kingdom by the might of my power, and for the honor of my majesty?"

The words were scarcely spoken when he heard a voice from heaven saying-

The apostle Paul says that if we would judge ourselves, then we would not have to be judged of God. If Nebuchadnezzar had listened to Daniel he would not have spent those terrible years with his reason gone.
